RE: Reimbursement Policy: Statewide Occupational Safety and Health

Conference, May 31 - June 2, 2024

The Regions, Locals, Units or individual are responsible for the expenses of the conference. The Regions, Locals and Units must use the reimbursement guidelines established by the Board of Directors. These guidelines provide **maximum** reimbursement rates; the Regions, Locals and Units must stay within the rates established but may adopt lower rates if they choose. In order for members to be reimbursed by their Region, Local or Unit, the member must have permission to attend.

The following are the policies that apply:

 Meal Allowances - The conference includes lunch on Saturday, June 1 and Sunday, June 2. For all other meals, restaurant receipts are not required when meals are paid by this meal allowance method. (Meals claimed when NOT staying overnight are considered taxable income to that individual and must be reported to the individual annually on the IRS form 1099-NEC.)

\$10.00 for breakfast if on Union business before 7:00 AM

\$15.00 for lunch if on Union business between 12:00 PM and 2:00 PM

\$30.00 for dinner if on Union business after 7:00 PM

These may be paid while en route or to cover all meals. In order to receive allowances en route, travelers must indicate their travel times on their expense vouchers.



- 2. Transportation The mileage rate is 67 cents per mile. Mileage is paid to those who use their automobiles. Tolls are paid when substantiated by receipts. Because toll receipts also verify the mode of transportation, when travelers use a non-toll road, they should indicate it on their vouchers. The cost of public transportation via plane, train, bus or taxi is paid when accompanied by receipts.
- 3. Lodging The hotel rates and fees are specified on our website: cseany.org/2024-osh-hotel-selection

The hotels do not take individual reservations. <u>DO NOT CONTACT HOTELS DIRECTLY</u> for lodging. Each member must complete the Hotel Reservation form by <u>April 24, 2024</u>, to secure a reservation. You will receive an acknowledgement email after your reservation is submitted. A confirmation number will be sent to you 10 days prior to the conference. Payments should be received prior to the conference to maintain your reservations. If there is a need to cancel a reservation it must be received by Central Files by <u>April 24, 2024</u>. Do not contact the hotel directly with a cancellation.

Questions Regarding Attendance

1. Who can attend?

All active members may attend. However, to be reimbursed for hotel and travel costs by the Local or Unit, attendees must have the approval from their Local/Unit President.

2. Do members have to be an officer/delegate to attend the conference?

No. The conference will provide important training for all members. Locals and Units are encouraged to send members of their safety and health committees. However, not all members are eligible for reimbursement of expenses or employee leave time.

3. How can I find out who my Local/Unit President is to obtain permission to attend in person? Contact CSEA's Member Solutions Center at 1-800-342-4146 or you can log into your MemberLink account at cseany.org and click on My Profile.

4. How many members can attend?

Please be advised that registration is limited to 500 attendees, and will be first come, first served.

5. How many members may a Local/Unit send to the conference?

As many as it wishes to send but the Local/Unit is responsible for all costs and expenses.

6. Will Locals/Units be reimbursed by CSEA for the costs and expenses of members attending?

7. What are the reimbursement rates?

Questions Regarding Registration

1. Where can I register?

2. What if I cannot log into MemberLink?

Contact CSEA's Member Resource Center at 1-800-342-4146. Please have your member ID number ready.

3. Is there a registration fee?

No

4. How do I register online?

You must have a valid personal email on file to register properly. Once logged into your MemberLink account, choose from the events list Statewide Conference on Occupational Safety and Health. Select one topic from each time slot. Once all are selected YOU MUST HIT THE SUBMIT BUTTON on the bottom right-hand corner of the page. If you do not hit the submit button you will **not** be registered.

5. Can I register by phone?

It's best to register online but yes, if needed you can call CSEA Headquarters at 1-800-342-4146 extension, 1214 for the Central Files Department or contact them directly at 1-518-257-1214. Please have your member ID number ready. *You must have a valid personal email on file to register properly.*

6. What is the registration deadline?

All attendees must register before 5:00 PM, April 24, 2024. Registration to attend will close when the 500 person maximum is reached.

7. Can I show up the day of the event and register?

No. There will be no onsite registration. To attend the event, you must pre-register.

8. Should I wait for my registration packet to come in the mail to register?

No. Registration information will only be sent through emails and is on the CSEA website.

9. Should I register for workshops or book my hotel first if attending in person?

Register for workshops first. Having a hotel room booked will not guarantee registration. With a maximum number of 500 people, registration may be filled quickly.

10. Will I receive confirmation once I register?

Yes. A confirmation email will be sent.

11. What if I do not receive confirmation for workshop registration?

The email may take a few hours to appear. It is also possible that the submit button was not pressd and you may not be registered. Contact CSEA's Central Files Department for assistance at 1-800-342-4146, extension 1214 or 518-257-1214 during normal business hours to see if you are registered or to have the confirmation email re-sent to you.

12. Can I view or change my workshop selections after I have been confirmed?

Yes. You can always review your scheduled workshops in MemberLink. Visit memberlink.cseany.org and log in. Click on menu item "EVENTS>LIST OF EVENTS" and then click on the event title Statewide Conference on Occupational Safety and Health. This will bring up a separate page listing of what sessions you have registered for. There is also an "Update my Registration" button on the event page which allows you to make changes. If a workshop has reached its capacity, attendees will not be able to select that workshop. There are no limits to capacity on the virtual sessions. After making any changes, please be sure to hit the SUBMIT button or the change will not go through. A second confirmation email will NOT be sent.

13. Why are there workshops that I cannot register for?

If a workshop is not available that means that the maximum number of attendees for that workshop has been reached.

14. How will I know what workshops I registered for?

You can always review your scheduled workshops in MemberLink. Visit memberlink.cseany.org and log in. Click on menu item "EVENTS>LIST OF EVENTS" and then click on the event title Statewide Conference on Occupational Safety and Health. This will bring up a separate page listing of what sessions you have registered for. Those attending will have a QR code on their badge which can be scanned to see their workshop schedule.

15. How do I make hotel reservations?

<u>Do not contact the Hotels directly.</u> Go to <u>cseany.org/2024-osh-hotel-selection</u>. Select the booking link for the hotel you would like to stay at. If a local/unit or CSEA is not covering the stay, the individual is responsible for the room charges. *Please do not make your hotel reservations prior to securing your workshop registration*.

16. Will the hotel ask for a separate credit card at check in and place a hold on the card for incidentals? Yes. Each hotel has a different incidental charge policy. Most properties will place a minimum of \$10 up to \$108. This charge is for incidental charges such as room service, snack purchases, or damages. The amount will be released after your stay unless a charge is made to your room. Detailed hotel information can be found in the Hotel Reservation Information page of this packet.

17. What if I have to cancel right before the conference due to illness?

Please contact Beverly Schissler at Empire Travel (518) 869-0455. Please stay home. Cancellations will be worked out to the best of our ability.

18. Will meals be served at the conference?

A buffet lunch will be provided on Saturday and a boxed lunch will be provided on Sunday. All other meals are on your own.

19. If I am not staying within walking distance, are there shuttles or nearby parking available?

Yes. The Placid XPRSS is a free shuttle service which runs from the Ski Jumps (the Olympic Jumping Complex, along Cascade Avenue and Sentinel Road (Route 73), then along Main Street to Saranac Avenue, ending at the Outpost Plaza (Price Chopper). The route then operates in reverse back to the Ski Jumps. To view the most current shuttle schedule, scan the QR code below.

ABOUT THE PLACID XPRSS

The Placid XPRSS is a free shuttle service which runs from the Ski Jumps (the Olympic Jumping Complex, along Cascade Avenue and Sentinel Road (Route 73), then along Main Street to Saranac Avenue, ending at the Outpost Plaza (Price Chopper). The route then operates in reverse back to the Ski Jumps. Occasional stops are scheduled for Greenwood Apartments (Greenwood St.) and the Adirondack Health Center on Old Military Road. Trolleys are used in the summer and buses are used in the winter.



Preparing Your Home for Emergencies

Many CSEA members work in a home setting. In addition to day care providers and those who assist the developmentally disabled, anyone going into a house to work should be aware of the potential hazards in it. Carbon monoxide, mold, radon, fire, and other hazards can hurt or make our members sick.

Tree Trimming and Logging Safety

Tree work is very dangerous. CSEA has lost too many of our own to preventable tree-related fatalities. This workshop will be taught by CSEA members who frequently do this work. Participants will learn what is required to safely cut trees, general chain-saw safety, the logging standard, first aid, personal protective equipment and more, so you can see if your employer is compliant with safe cutting operations.

Work Zone Safety

Working on or near a traveled road is statistically the deadliest job task in CSEA. Work zones do not only apply to DOT. Sewers, refuse, engineering, DPW, and other workers face traffic threats as well. If your work affects traffic, your employer must have a traffic control plan by law.

Safety and Health Activist

Activists are champions in the workplace; be a champion for safety! Union representatives on the front lines are the eyes, ears, and voice of the leadership and play a key role in keeping our members safe on-the-job. Knowing what to look for and what to do may mean the difference between life and death.

Keeping Track of Injuries and Illnesses

Your employer can't hide from the numbers and they can't keep them from you. Injury and exposure records that you need in your fight for workplace safety MUST be made accessible to any employee who requests it. They are legally required to provide them, and you are protected for exercising your rights to them.

Communicable Diseases-Lessons Learned From the Pandemic

As we move from COVID-19 being a global pandemic, to a seasonal disease, it is important to reflect on all the knowledge we have gained and how to apply it to build a more prepared and resilient future for our workplaces, families, and our union.

Safety and Health Training Requirements

Employers are required to provide safety and health training on several topics, depending on the work that is assigned. Learn how to assess what training your members are required to receive and how to advocate for the most effective and useful training possible.

Controlling Hazards and Picking Up the Pieces

OSHA and PESH both require employers to control recognized hazards in the workplace. This program will explore the most effective measures to address workplace hazards as well as discuss first aide requirements and what to do if someone is hurt at work.

Keeping Playgrounds and Parks Safe

Parks and playgrounds can be full of hazards. Dangerous equipment, devices, animals, insects, and weather all can ruin your day.

Know Your Rights, Protect Your Rights

Attend this workshop to learn about your legal rights. What steps do you need to take to handle sexual harassment? What is involved in obtaining a reasonable accommodation? What protections do employees have if they discover their employer is breaking the law?

Building Power Politically to Protect Members

From electing legislators who support your goals to passing good legislation to advance your safety and health agenda, legislation and politics impact your life every day. This workshop will discuss how you can help to improve the safety and health of CSEA members from the ballot box to legislatures in Washington, Albany, and your local government.

Setting up Your Union Safety Committee for Success

New and seasoned leadership can use help. An important part of a well-organized local or unit is a strong committee structure. A union safety committee can make a big difference in ensuring a safe and healthy workplace for the members. This workshop will explore common elements of successful committees and how they can be used to help advance your safety.

Workplace Solutions -- Getting Engaged

With the current attacks on our union and public services, it is more important than ever that we mobilize workers and build power. Since June 2018, public sector members can choose whether to stay members or decline membership. Overwhelmingly, CSEA members keep choosing CSEA. Building a strong union means building from within and connecting with every new hire from day one to get involved and stay involved. Safety and Health at the workplace is an important issue to all members and is an excellent avenue to involve your membership. This workshop will discuss various resources and strategies to engage your membership and build strong long-lasting relationships.

The NYS DOL PESH Bureau; Your Partner in Protection

This introductory session will educate participants about New York State's Public Employee Safety and Health Bureau. Learn the who, what, where and why of the agency that protects you as a worker. Participants will also be given an overview of OSHA / PESH training requirements.

Bad Behavior in the Workplace

The thin line between bullying and workplace violence isn't always clear on-the-job. Navigating workplace conflicts is also a big challenge. There are methods and strategies that provide support for dealing with these difficult workplace situations.

To Thrive or Not Thrive in the Direct Care Workforce: The Impact of Stress, Burnout, and Resilience Direct care presents many challenges. Potentially dangerous work coupled with short staffing and overtime can quickly lead to fatigue and burnout. This program will discuss how to cope with challenges and build resiliency.

School Violence

Violence in our schools is nothing new. After an amendment to the law last year, school districts are now required to comply with the NYS Public Employees Workplace Violence Prevention Law. This program will address the challenges faced in schools and what the employer must do to protect employees.

Emergency Action Plans; Preparing for Emergencies at Work

Do you know what your role is in an emergency? All workers must be trained on their responsibilities when an emergency occurs. Fires, and other catastrophic events require your employer to be ready, this program will help you navigate emergency action plans.

Safety and Health Activist

Activists are champions in the workplace; be a champion for safety! Union representatives on the front lines are the eyes, ears, and voice of the leadership and play a key role in keeping our members safe on-the-job. Knowing what to look for and what to do may mean the difference between life and death.

Working cooperatively with management is the best way to solve any workplace issue, especially safety and health issues. Before you file a PESH complaint or grievance, it is always best to exhaust labor-management. This program will discuss various strategies to address issues with management.

Stress, The Workplace, and You

Stress affects almost everyone in the workplace and is what is known as a universal issue. This workshop will help you not only build coping strategies for yourself but also learn how to organize around the issue and collectively fight for a less stressful workplace.

Protect Your Hearing

Your hearing is too important to lose! This program will explain how ears work, how noise can damage your hearing and what employers can do to protect their workers. You'll also learn how hearing impacts your health and what to do if you are experiencing trouble hearing.

Zoonosis-Animal Hazards and Work

Animals in the workplace present many unique concerns. Working with wild and domesticated animals can expose members to infectious diseases that can jump from animals to humans. This program will explore what to look out for and what your employer should be doing.

Workplace Solutions -- Getting Organized

Get organized for success! Beating the boss isn't easy, but you can do it. This program will show you how to organize for success.

Recognizing & Addressing Secondary Trauma & PTSD in the Workplace

Witnessing trauma can be just as harmful and is often referred to as experiencing secondary stress. During many members' work, traumatic situations are a regular occurrence as is survivor's guilt. It is important to know the signs and symptoms of secondary stress and where to find needed help and resources.

The Vicious Cycle of Injuries and Addiction

CSEA members have their backs broken every day. Members' lives are ruined by these injuries and addiction from frequently prescribed opioids. Employers can minimize the chance of getting hurt by eliminating or reducing the conditions that lead to injury. It's also important to know how prescription opioid use can lead to addiction and alternatives to ask your physician or occupational clinic about.

Communicating Safety to Your Members

Communication is key- whether it is to notify members of a big win, an upcoming training opportunity or getting them involved in a safety campaign. It is important to know what tools are at your disposal in print, digital and social media resources.

Integrating PESH and OSHA into Your Strategic Plan

Regulatory intervention can solve your problems or leave you with egg on your face. PESH and OSHA complaints should be utilized as a last resort and may not always have the outcome you want. Know when you SHOULD make the call, and when you may want to wait.

Hurt at Work, Workers' Compensation and Disability Insurance

Workers' Compensation is a NIGHTMARE. Workers need all the help available to get through the system and back up on their feet. Those who can't return to work will need to know about Social Security Disability. Workers and their representatives need to know everything they can to get through this mess.

The Respiratory Protection Standard and You

Working around infectious or hazardous materials may require respiratory protection. A lot must happen before workers can be issued a respirator. This program will discuss the employer requirements and all the steps that must be completed.

Workplace Violence, a 15-year RESET

Some workplace violence programs were completed over a decade ago. Those programs may have been implemented by different union leadership and management. The workplace may have changed, but did the programs? These programs should be evolving and changing over time.
