

Summary of the New York State Executive Budget Proposal FY 2025-2026

State Agencies

Civil Service

- Extends the New York Helps Program through June 30, 2026.
- Waives state civil service exam fees through June 30, 2026.
- Launches the New York State Jobs Portal and Application Tracking System to modernize recruitment, streamline hiring, and improve civil service efficiency.
- Introduces an optional lag pay program for state employees hired on or after July 1, 2026, allowing an earlier issuance of a paycheck, repayable over 14 pay periods. Under the current system, new state employees wait four weeks for their first paycheck. This change would require negotiations with each state union.

State University of New York (SUNY)

- Adds \$125 million in additional state support for SUNY State-operated campuses.
- Provides \$100 million in operating assistance to prevent the closure of SUNY Downstate University Hospital & Medical Center.
- Allocates \$450 million in capital funding for SUNY Downstate University Hospital & Medical Center (in addition to \$300 million from last year).
- Grants \$200 million to help build a new emergency department at SUNY Upstate.

Office of Mental Health (OMH)

- Adds 100 new forensic inpatient state operated psychiatric beds at Manhattan Psychiatric Center and proposes a \$160 million capital investment to expand the forensic unit.
- Reforms the involuntary commitment process by empowering more professionals to intervene when individuals are at substantial risk of harm to themselves or others.

Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD)

- Invests \$18 million to renovate the Sunmount campus in Tupper Lake. This
 funding will support roof replacements, exterior repairs, kitchen and bathroom
 renovations, and paving of roadways and parking lots.
- Provides \$75 million in funding to modernize the OPWDD Institute for Basic Research in Staten Island.
- Provides a 2.1% wage COLA for human service workers in not-for-profit agencies.

Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS)

- Allocates \$400 million in new funding for the acceleration and continued installation of fixed cameras in all facilities.
- Provides \$18.4 million for the expansion of the body camera program.

State Department of Education

Invests \$150 million to renovate the State Museum in Albany.

Department of Health

 Provides \$25 million to modernize and enhance State Veterans' Homes and Helen Hayes Hospital.

Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation

Allocates \$200 million to enhance and improve state parks.

Department of Agriculture

Provides \$44 million in capital investments at the State Fairgrounds.

Unified Court System

• **Increases** funding by \$264 million over last year's appropriation.

Olympic Regional Development Authority

 Grants \$110 million in capital funding to support projects at Olympic facilities in Lake Placid and Belleayre Mountain Ski Center.

Department of Transportation

 Raises criminal penalties from a Class A misdemeanor to a Class D felony for individuals who assault a highway worker employed by the Department of Transportation or any state agency or public authority.

Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV)

 Raises criminal penalties from a Class A misdemeanor to a Class D felony for individuals who assault a DMV employee, including motor vehicle license examiner and motor vehicle representative.

Canal Corporation

 Invests \$50 million in the New York State Canal System, including dam and lock repair.

Other Issues of Note

- Enhances the existing Work Zone Speed Camera Program by:
 - Making the program permanent.
 - Expanding it to the New York State Bridge Authority and the Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority.
 - o **Increasing penalties** to \$125 for a second violation and \$175 for a third or subsequent violation within an 18-month period.
- Requires state and public authority employees who use technology as part of their jobs to take annual cybersecurity awareness training.
- Mandates supervisors and employees that work in human resources in state agencies to take gender-based violence training.

Local Governments

Funding

- Increases Aid and Incentives to Municipalities by \$50 million, totaling **\$765.2** million.
- Provides \$15 million in one-time assistance to **Monroe County.**
- Allocates \$335 million to Albany through the "Championing Albany's Potential Initiative," to increase economic development, public safety, and enhance affordability.

Workforce

- Raises criminal penalties from a Class A misdemeanor to a Class D felony for individuals who assault a highway worker employed by a municipality.
- Mandates cybersecurity awareness training for all local government employees, funded by the state.
- Removes the maximum age limit of 35 for law enforcement recruitment.

Community Colleges

- Maintains a funding floor for community colleges at 100% of prior year funding, preventing a \$124 million loss in formula aid due to enrollment declines.
- Allocates \$449 million for SUNY Community College operations, marking a \$32 million increase from last year.
- Provides \$131 million new capital funding for SUNY Community Colleges.
- Implements **free community college** for students aged 25 to 55 pursuing associate degrees in high-demand industries, including advanced manufacturing, technology, cybersecurity, engineering, artificial intelligence, nursing, green and renewable energy.

Transportation

- Maintains funding for the following programs at last year's levels:
 - Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS).
 - o Extreme Winter Recovery Program.
 - Marchiselli Program.
 - o Pave Our Potholes.
 - o BRIDGE NY Program.
- Adds \$5 million for the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority.
- Proposes \$3 billion in funding for New York City mass transit.

Infrastructure

Permits counties, cities, towns, and villages to use the **Dormitory Authority** (**DASNY**) for planning, design, procurements, and construction management services for municipal projects.

Social Services

• Introduces **self-service kiosks** in high need communities to access public benefits like SNAP, WIC, and childcare subsidies.

Education

K-12

- Increases School Aid by **\$1.7 billion** (4.7%), bringing the total to \$37.4 billion.
- **Guarantees** that no school district will receive less than a 2% year-over-year increase in Foundation Aid.
- Implements universal free breakfast and lunch for all students in public, private, and charter schools participating in the federal school lunch program.
- Bans the use of internet-enabled devices (e.g., smart phones, smart watches) during school hours, with \$13.5 million for implementation. Schools must submit plans for compliance, effective in the 2025-2026 school year.

Libraries

- Increases **library aid** to \$104.6 million, a \$700,000 increase from last year.
- Provides \$34 million for **library construction**, a decrease of \$10 million.

Healthcare

Workforce Issues

- Launches the Career Pathways Training Program to fund tuition, textbooks, and educational support for careers in behavioral health, social care, and healthcare. Participants must commit to a three-year term working with Medicaid-serving providers.
- Joins the national nurse licensure compact, enabling out-of-state registered nurses to practice in New York.
- Expands **Certified Nursing Assistants**' scope of practice to include medication administration in nursing homes.

Safety-Net Hospitals

- Allocates \$1 billion in new funding to the Health Care Facility Transformation Program, which provides capital funding to support projects at safety-net hospitals.
- Expands the Safety Net Transformation Program with an additional \$300 million investment.

Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center

 Maintains funding at last year's level - \$55.4 million in state operating funding and \$51.3 million in capital funding.

Childcare

- Allocates \$10 million to fund renovations and repairs for family childcare programs.
- Establishes the **NY Coalition for Child Care**, a partnership aimed at developing a universal childcare system in New York.
- Creates a childcare substitute pool to ensure access to verified and qualified professionals when regular staff are unavailable.

Workers' Compensation

- Updates the fee schedule to **align with Medicare**, encouraging more providers to treat Workers' Compensation patients.
- Automatically authorizes all licensed medical providers to treat Workers' Compensation claimants.
- **Mandates** health insurers to cover medical treatments while Workers' Compensation claims are under dispute.
- Allows Workers' Compensation insurers to pay medical bills temporarily without admitting liability.

Retirees

- Reforms the state reimbursement for the Income Related Medicare Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) by:
 - Eliminating the state's IRMAA reimbursement to NYSHIP enrollees.
 - Providing a premium reimbursement to:
 - 1) State employees who retired between **1983 and 2012**.
 - 2) Employees who retired in 2012 or after at Grade 9 or below.
 - The premium reimbursement will be equal to the savings from eliminating the IRMAA reimbursement (approximately \$12.5 million annually) and spreading it across all eligible retirees (estimated to be 89,000 people).
 - IRMAA is paid by Medicare recipients with annual incomes exceeding \$106,000 (\$212,000 for joint filers) with costs ranging from \$70 to \$419 per month.

Revenue

- **Extends** the state tax surcharge on high earners for five years.
- Reduces income taxes for joint filers making up to \$323,200 annually, benefiting **77% of New Yorkers**.
- Introduces an **inflation refund**, providing:
 - o \$500 checks to families earning less than \$300,000.
 - o \$300 checks to individuals earning less than \$ \$150,000.
- Increases the Child Tax Credit to:
 - o \$1,000 per child under the age of four.
 - o \$500 per child aged four through 16 (up from the current \$330 maximum).
