CSEA,

What the bill does: Increases criminal penalties for assaulting certain employees of the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and Department of Transportation (DOT) and similar employees in local governments and the private sector.

Why it matters: Public employees who interact with the public are more likely to be assaulted while working. In a survey of New York motor vehicle license examiners, more than 50 percent of respondents said that they experienced workplace violence, including being <u>kidnapped</u>, <u>slapped</u>, <u>punched</u>, and being threatened with physical violence.

Key Provisions:

- Raises criminal penalties from a Class A misdemeanor to a Class D felony for assaulting a:
 - Motor vehicle license examiner
 - Motor vehicle representative
 - o Highway worker (state, local government, or private sector)
 - o Motor carrier investigator
 - Motor vehicle inspector

The bottom line: Increasing penalties for assaulting these workers will **deter** future violence and help ensure employees can go to work **without fear of being assaulted or killed**.
